Blessing and Dismissal

Dear Friends and People of God,

'But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you.' (from Luke 6)

The Gospel reading for the Seventh Sunday after the Epiphany is asking a lot, isn't it?

Love our enemies, do good to those who hate us, bless those who curse us, pray for those who mistreat us? If anyone strikes us on the cheek, offer the other also? Jesus is asking a lot of those who follow him. These teachings just seem so difficult, and, frankly, so misused over the years, that it is tempting to ignore them.

And yet, Jesus tells us in no uncertain terms to love our enemies. And we are left to wrestle with what it means to do just that.

When I ponder this, I always have to think of Archbishop Tutu. He never deviated from what the Bible taught him – to love and forgive one's enemies.

He was asked his secret to doing this. How was he able to live by these challenging teachings of Jesus? Bishop Tutu's answered this question in an interview, when he said this: "I hold on, and often only by the skin of my teeth, to believe that God is in charge of his world, in spite of all appearances to the contrary."

When we truly believe that, then we can love even our enemies. We can pray for those who mistreat us. We can turn the other cheek. And we can forgive.

Jesus lived by this, his own teaching, too. He chose to love his enemies, even when they mocked him and spat upon him. He was determined to do good to those who hated him, even when they cried out for his crucifixion. He opted to bless them when they cursed him, and he prayed for them when they abused him. Even when hanging from the cross, he forgave those who put him there: "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" The world will know we are followers of Jesus by our love for one another. But the world will become convinced of this love, when we love even our enemies, just as Jesus taught us to do. Let us love God, and love ourselves, and love one another. But let us also learn to love those who will not love us back, until all the world knows the love that we are blessed to have in Jesus. To the glory of God. *With my love and prayers: Andi*
